The Holy Father thanked those

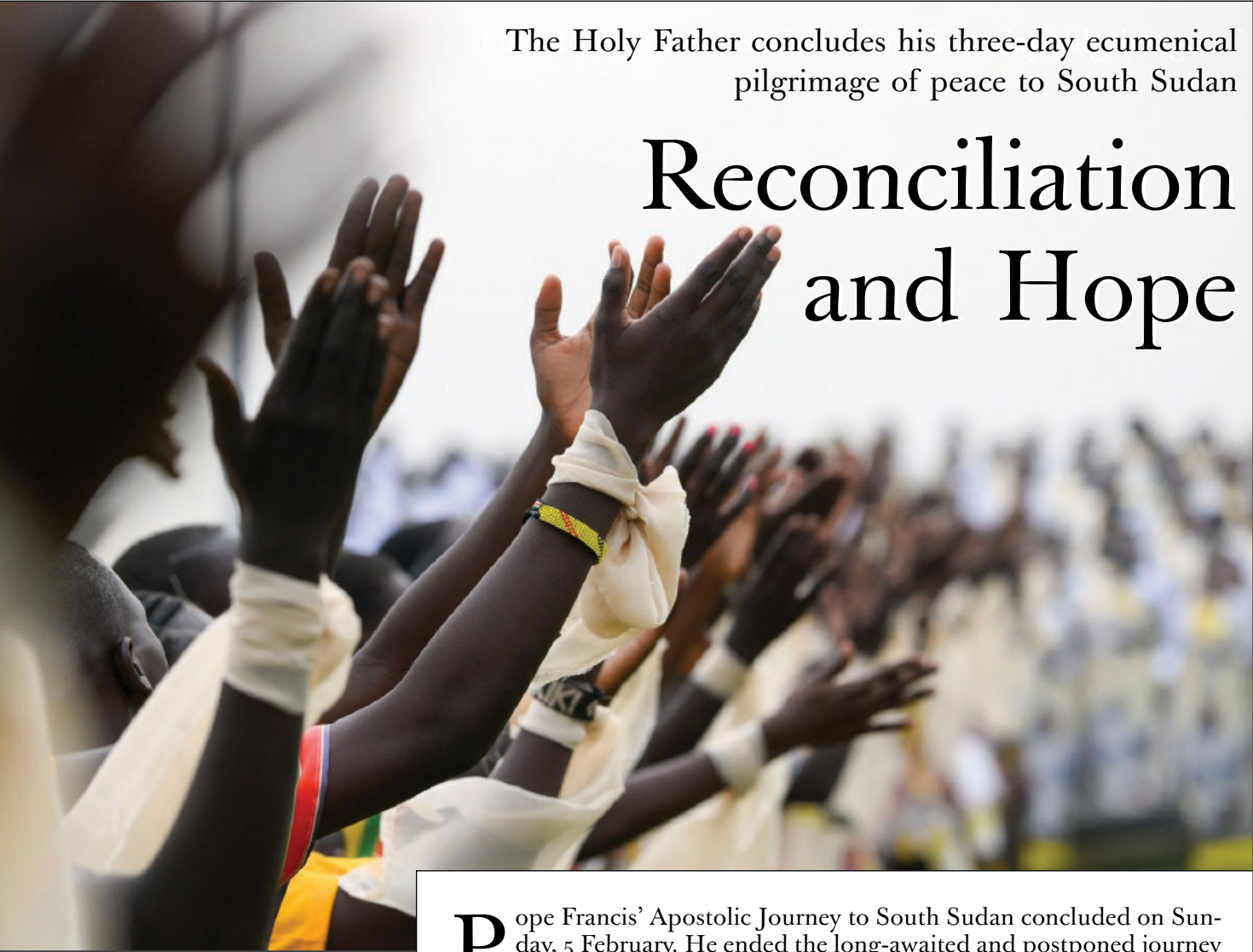
who are working to bring relief, and encouraged everyone to show solidarity with those territories, “some of which have already been battered by a long war”.

## Reconciliation and Hope



Pope Francis' Apostolic Journey to South Sudan concluded on Sunday, 5 February. He ended the long-awaited and postponed journey with words of encouragement and hope for the impoverished and war-ravaged people, telling them never to forget that Jesus knows their pain and loves them.

During his stay in Juba, he also had strong words for the country's leadership, openly expressing his disappointment for not having honoured the pledges they had made to cement peace and work for reconciliation and development.

His voice wasn't a solitary one: his visit took the form of an Ecumenical Pilgrimage for Peace in the company of the Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby and the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland Iain Greenshields.

Together they prayed with the people and called for unity; the three voices were one issuing a powerful appeal for peace and reconciliation in the divided nation. Together they challenged the country's political leaders to stand true to their pledges to work for the common good, and to shy away from corruption and personal benefits

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## Songs in the night

We came back singing, with the songs of the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and of South Sudan still in our ears, that is, in our hearts. That's what it means to remember: to bring back to the heart. Among the memories of this long journey to two countries, the first one that lingers and lasts is of the songs.

The songs of DRC and those of South Sudan are different from one another (due to their different histories), but both spring forth from where one would least expect. They are “songs in the night”, as the Pope said to some 100,000 people gathered in Juba, during his homily dedicated to the proclamation of Crucified and Risen Christ, on Sunday morning, 5 February; it is “a message of hope. Jesus knows your anguish and the hope you bear in your hearts, the joys and struggles that mark your lives, the darkness that assails you and the faith that, like a song in the night, you raise to heaven. Jesus knows you and loves you. If we remain in him, we must never fear, because for us too, every cross will turn into a resurrection, every sadness into hope, and every lament into dancing”.

Songs and dancing: we have seen two peoples sing and dance, despite living in the shadows of a night that seems not to open up to a dawn that is still far away.

Two peoples, two rivers. In his discourses, the Pope often turned to the image of the two great rivers which mark and in some
